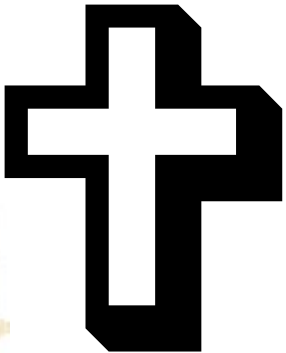

### Key knowledge for this unit

The story of 'Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden' (Genesis 2:15-17 and Genesis 3)

- ✝ God made Adam and Eve, the first man and woman
- ✝ Adam and Eve are put in a beautiful paradise called the Garden of Eden
- ✝ In the Garden of Eden there is a special tree called, "The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil" and God told Adam and Eve they must not eat the fruit from this tree
- ✝ Tricked by a snake, Adam and Eve ate the fruit that they were told not to eat
- ✝ God ordered Adam and Eve out of the Garden of Eden
- ✝ Adam and Eve had to live in the imperfect, harsh world outside of the Garden of Eden
- ✝ The story of Adam and Eve is often called "The Fall"

### Vocabulary you will use:

Word	Definition
forbidden	Not allowed
imperfect	An antonym for perfect. The prefix im- changes it to the opposite meaning.
sin	An immoral act

The traditional Christian interpretation follows the ideas that:

- ✝ All humans were created by God perfect and without sin (Genesis 5:1-2)
- ✝ Because Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit all humankind have fallen, and no human is perfect
- ✝ All humans are born in sin. This sin is called, "original sin"
- ✝ Without fixing what Adam and Eve had done wrong humankind cannot be in a close relationship with God and no human can enter heaven.
