


Key knowledge for this unit

- Buddhists believe "rebirth" involves the belief that when we die, our actions in this life give rise to a new existence. This is called the "cycle of rebirth".
- Buddhists believe that "karma" is that all intentional actions that are good or bad give rise to consequences in the next life and karma is a naturally occurring process which is not a judgement made by God.
- Buddhists believe that rebirth only ends when a person extinguishes within themselves craving and achieves the spiritual goal of Buddhism which is 'Nirvana'.
- Some Buddhists believe Nirvana is a real place gained by those who achieve enlightenment, while some Buddhists take the view that Nirvana is a state of mind and not a physical place.
- Some Buddhists believe Nirvana is flawless, a place or state of mind where there is the highest possible experiences of calmness, serenity, happiness, and contentment.
